## **Charter Agreement** with Boy Scouts of America

JUST PRIOR TO OUR CHAPTER MEETING on April 13, the George Washington Chapter signed an agreement with the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) agreeing to be a Charter organization for a newly forming BSA Cub Scout Pack in Alexandria, Va. After several months of research and coordination between SAR and BSA, Chapter Compatriot Marty Johnson, Chairman of the Scouting and Youth Activities Committee, and Manager-at-Large Rand Pixa, presented the proposal to the Chapter Board of Managers, which approved the proposal on April 9. In coordination with Mr. Colin Tridone, BSA Senior District Executive, Colonial District, an elementary school in the Alexandria area was selected based on having adult parents in the school who are willing to serve as Unit leaders and the school administration offering to allow the BSA to have a BSA Unit meet on the school premises. The important agreement allows for additional students in the Alexandria area to join Scouting.

The purpose of the BSA program is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values and principles taught in the Scout Oath and Scout Law. The George Washington Chapter, as a duly constituted Charter organization that serves youth, desires to use the program(s) of the BSA to further its mission respecting the youth it supports. The Local Council provides the support and service necessary to help the Chapter succeed in its use of Scouting.

The George Washington Chapter is pleased to support the Boy Scouts of America based on our common goals related to patriotism, education, and community service.





## Jefferson's Birthday Commemoration

Thomas Jefferson Memorial, Washington, D.C., April 13



**SATURDAY, APRIL 13**, marked the 281st birthday of Thomas Jefferson, our nation's third President. The George Washington Chapter, represented by Compatriots Mike Elston, Mark Jackson, and Paul McComb, participated in the event to observe President Jefferson's birthday.

A native Virginian, Jefferson was a Founding Father and the "pen" of the American Revolution, authoring notable documents like the Declaration of Independence in 1776 and the Virginia Statute of Religious Freedom in 1777.

The George Washington and Sgt. Maj. John Champe Chapters joined event sponsor, the D.C. Society SAR (DC SAR), and other heritage societies in presenting wreaths on behalf of the President of the United States, Secretary of the Interior, and the University of Virginia. SAR Treasurer General Mike Elston presented a wreath on behalf of President General John L. Dodd of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution.

The event Master of Ceremonies was Richard E. Patten, Past President of the DC SAR, music was provided by the U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own" Brass Quintet, and the colors were presented by the Joint Armed Forces Color Guard.



#### An interview with Compatriot Dr. Donald F. Reynolds

*IN MARCH 2024*, the George Washington Chapter leadership bestowed the title of Past President Emeritus to Don Reynolds, Past Virginia Society President as well as Past George Washington Chapter President and Chaplain. The Emeritus status is in honor of Dr. Reynolds' years of dedicated service to the SAR and for the high regard of his many positive contributions to this Chapter.

Past President Jay Henn nominated Dr. Reynolds for this honor, noting that he has been an enduring cornerstone supporter and leader of the George Washington Chapter for many years. Since joining the SAR in the 1980s, Dr. Reynolds has made enduring contributions to the gentlemanly character of the Chapter while continuously making more tangible contributions. He served as Chapter President in 1994, going on to become the President of the State Society for the 2000-2001 term. Notably, following this honorable service, Dr. Reynolds continues to participate in Chapter events whenever possible. He and his Mustang convertible were fixtures in annual George Washington Birthday parades and National Memorial Day parades. He rarely missed a wreath-laying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier or a Chapter meeting. Not only did he provide direct support during visits by many SAR Presidents General, he also generously supported access to various venues for Chapter gatherings and has long supported membership through the Amenities Committee he chaired. He truly stands out for making the George Washington Chapter what it is today.

Born in 1939 near Blacksburg in south-central Virginia, Dr. Reynolds grew up as an only child during World War II. His father worked at the Soil Conservation Service at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (VPI, now Virginia Technical University). The Service analyzed soil samples to assist farmers with agricultural production. His mother taught 3rd grade and ensured all her students learned to write in cursive, a practice that Dr. Reynolds continues teaching today to two of his seven grandchildren whom he drives to school every morning.



Upon graduating with degrees in science (organic chemistry) and dentistry, Dr. Reynolds joined the Air Force as a dentist during the Vietnam War. He has been happily married to Mrs. Suzanne Reynolds (Smola) for 58 years, and together they have three grown children. They met on a double-blind date and were married two years later. He went on to join the Air Force two months after their wedding. Dr. Reynolds' U.S. ancestry reaches back to the colonial days when ancestor William Reynolds assisted Major General Nathanael Greene's army when it passed through south-central Virginia. Along with Dr. Reynold's dedication to the SAR, Mrs. Reynolds has served as the Senior National President of the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution (N.S.C.A.R.).

While growing up during WWII, Dr. Reynolds recalls that everything, including food and gasoline, was rationed. This was the result of the U.S. government instituting a controlled economy that distributed coupons for citizens to buy everyday food and goods. His family had tenants on an 11-acre family farm that provided additional produce and supplies. A few vivid memories Dr. Reynolds shares include attending the local Baptist Church, fellow neighbors being conservative and patriotic, and cadets from the Virginia Polytechnic Institute being called up for service upon graduation, and watching them march to the train station to go to war. Additionally, during his teenage years, Dr. Reynolds loved dancing the jitterbug to Big Band music that included fancy black-tie events with live performances by Benny Goodman and others. A local TV station in Roanoke regularly broadcasted student dances at the local high schools, including his Blacksburg high school.

Dr. Reynolds' high school was known for its academic standards, and he was an A student involved in the drama club and taking photos for the yearbook. Still today, Dr. Reynolds believes It is important for students to get as much education as they can, noting that "all else can be lost, except one's education." Part of Dr. Reynolds' education and work ethic also stemmed from his participation in the Boy Scouts of America and a job delivering newspapers. By saving money from his work delivering papers, he was able to buy his first car, a 1948 Chevrolet Fleetline. In his youth, Dr. Reynolds learned to work with his hands from a neighbor whose hobby was building and flying model airplanes. He would later apply these skills to his professional work as a dentist, after being exposed to this career through his father's cousin, who was a practicing dentist.

While serving as a captain in the U.S. Air Force (1965-1967) during the Vietnam War, Dr. Reynolds was among 20 military dentists in two base clinics in Mississippi, learning a lot as he rotated through surgery. While living in the Magnolia State, he and his family took up boating on the Gulf of Mexico. After serving in the Air Force, Dr. Reynolds and his wife decided to move from Mississippi to Alexandria, Va. upon responding to an advertisement from Dr. Frank Stone, DDS in the American Dental Association Magazine. They rented an apartment on Route 1 while saving money to buy their first house for \$30,000, two doors down from their current residence. After working with Dr. Stone, Dr. Reynolds branched out, practicing dentistry for 50 years.

Dr. Reynolds views his membership in the George Washington Chapter as good fortune, because it was the largest and most active chapter in the state of Virginia. In the 1970s in Alexandria, his mother-in-law helped him trace his lineage and become a SAR member. As a member of Belle Haven Country Club, he enjoyed gatherings there and highlighted that current meetings at the Mount Vernon Country Club are ideal because of the geographic proximity to President George Washington's home. After serving in the Chapter, Dr. Reynolds also became involved in the State Society for six years, along with so many George Washington Chapter members who are active in state leadership. Dr. Reynolds' fondest SAR memories include learning about Virginia's extensive history and attending national conventions, including in San Francisco (at The Mark Hopkins Hotel on the waterfront). His favorite part of the SAR is attending gatherings and socializing with fellow compatriots, and on rare occasions sipping Johny Walker Black together.

On the current status of the George Washington Chapter, Dr. Reynolds sees the Chapter as "doing all the right things, including good programs and good venues." The incorporation of younger generations, according to Dr. Reynolds, helps the Chapter continue to thrive and allows officers the opportunity to serve at the state level. Dr. Reynolds views Chapter members as "a well-informed group of patriots who are continuing to carry out the mission of SAR." He recommends maintaining the current Chapter leadership structure, which allows leaders to gain the necessary experience to succeed at both the chapter and state levels. He suggests keeping one's SAR membership active and increasing one's membership. Dr. Reynolds notes that "because members have to work to join SAR by proving their ancestral lineage, this justifies staying with it and participating in meetings that are insightful into both U.S. history and current events."

Reflecting on our country, Dr. Reynolds said this: "In the United States, everyone has an opportunity to make something of themselves based on their education, not their past. Our nation is relatively young compared to the rest of the world, and although we make mistakes, we can correct them. Everybody has an opportunity in this country."

Dr. Reynolds sees himself as very fortunate and wants to be remembered for being pleasant and kind. "The world has been good to me...I have a great wife and a great family. We all need to have good relationships with others, including a family. Our diversity makes us stronger."

### Chapter Color Guard opens GWU vs. GMU rugby match

Fairfax, Va., April 19

THANKS TO A REFERRAL by Chapter and Chapter America Compatriot 250 Committee Chairman Edgar Bates, the Chapter was contacted by a representative of the George University Rugby Mason Alumni Association to inquire about enlisting the services of the Chapter's Color Guard. The Color Guard presence was requested to open a rugby match between George 7 p.m. Washington University and George Mason University with expected guests to include the George Mason University president and other local dignitaries. The George Mason Rugby Club was described as the oldest University team in the Washington area (1965) and reportedly the first to play at the intercollegiate level. Chapter Color Guardsmen Mark Jackson and Paul McComb were willing and able to both participate in the event and to further the Chapter's community outreach.

Upon request, the rugby match organizers heartily agreed to announce the Color Guard as being from the George Washington Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution and, in addition to the announcement, they agreed to include a brief history of the SAR and its Mission:

Since 1889, the Sons of the American Revolution honor their Revolutionary War patriot ancestors by promoting patriotism, serving their communities, and educating to inspire future generations about the founding principles of our country. With a membership of over 37,000 members in 550 Chapters across the United States, SAR members play active roles in continuing to promote the underlying ideas of our Founding Fathers... such as George Washington and George Mason!

In addition to the Chapter's own Color Guardsmen, Commander Jackson and McComb, Virginia Color Guardsmen Barry Schwoerer and Steve Van Deusen from the Sgt. Maj. John Champe Virginia SAR chapter joined the assembly. An estimated 75 attendees were in the turnout.

May through the years with George Washington

- **1784** on the 4th--Washington attends first meeting of the Society of the Cincinnati.
- **1785** on the 17th--Washington elected president of the Potomac Canal Company.
- **1787** on the 25th--Washington elected president of Constitutional Convention.
- **1789** on the 14th--Congress officially adopts "*President of the United States*" as a form of address for new leader.
- **1802** on the 22nd--Death of Martha Washington.

By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War. Five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signers' houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.


