The VASSAR Semi-Annual Meeting, held on Sept 19th thru 20th at the Hyatt Fairfax, was well attended, including 15 GW Chapter members. We also conducted our September chapter meeting at the Hyatt Fairfax at the conclusion of the VASSAR

Semi-Annual meeting. Immediate Past President General Joe Dooley and several VASSAR officers, including Reverdy Wright (1<sup>st</sup> VP), Wayne Rouse (Secretary) and our own Mike Elston (3<sup>rd</sup> VP) and Bob Carr (Assist Secretary) were in attendance.

At our chapter meeting, Mike Elston presented the highlights of the 124<sup>th</sup> SAR National Congress in Greenville, SC. Chapter officers (Treasurer Greg Bodge and Secretary Ernie Coggins) and committee chairman (Awards Chair Paul Wagoner; Graves Registration Chair Jamie Calender; Public Relations Chair Ernie Coggins; and Veterans Services Chair Greg Bodge) gave updates on their program areas.

I'm pleased to inform you that our September meeting was one of the shortest chapter meetings we have had in a long time, lasting one hour; but it was very informative. Several new members attended and we introduced our newly appointed Newsletter Editor Richard Gilliland and Dave Thomas as our new Chapter Registrar effective January 2015. Paul Walden will continue to stay involved in registrations as Assistant Chapter Registrar. A BIG thank you Paul for the hard work you have done for us as Chapter Registrar during 2014 and a BIG thank you to our outgoing Newsletter Editor Matthew Jones as well for his dedication over this past year to producing a top quality newsletter.

## 250<sup>th</sup> Pittsburgh Block House Celebration



David Thomas (above) of the George Washington Chapter was invited by the Daughters of the American Revolution, Pittsburgh Chapter on August 9 to attend the 250th celebration of the Fort Pitt Block House in Pittsburgh, PA; joining the Pennsylvania Sons of the American Revolution, Pittsburgh Chapter, at the celebration.

The Fort Pitt Block House, constructed in 1764, is the oldest Pre-Revolution building in Western Pennsylvania. It is also the oldest authenticated structure west of the Allegheny Mountains and the last surviving structure associated with Fort Pitt, circa 1758, which is located at the confluence of the Allegheny and Monongahela Rivers forming the great Ohio River. Fort Pitt was built by the British as part of a strategic plan to claim territorial possession of the region, to defend colonists against Native American Indian attack and to control navigation and trading on the three rivers. During the American Revolution Fort Pitt served as the headquarters for the Western Theater.

Today, the Fort Pitt Block House is an historical site under the watchful custodianship of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Pittsburgh Chapter and the Fort Pitt Society. To honor and recognize the significance of the Fort Pitt Block House, a 250th celebration was



organized by the DAR-Pittsburgh Chapter and the Fort Pitt Society. The all-day celebration included diverse living-history demonstrations and a formal patriotic ceremony that included a variety of state and local leaders, musical artists, and guest speakers.

The event further gave opportunity for SAR members to interact with each other and with their DAR-Pittsburgh Chapter hosts, including Elisabeth Wheatley, President, Donna Knechtel-Paszek, Treasurer, and Marion Thomas, Director of History.

PSAR Compatriots Bill McKim, Esq., Secretary, Rennick Steele, Treasurer, and Keith Russell, member, represented the Pittsburgh Chapter. David Thomas represented the George Washington Chapter.

## **George Washington Chapter Honored by National Society as Nation's Best Large Chapter**

Greenville, SC -- At the 124th National Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution this past July, the National Society presented two of its three most prestigious awards for chapters to the George Washington Chapter, effectively giving the Chapter bragging rights as the best large chapter in the nation. This is the first time

the chapter has won either of these awards in its 60-year history. Immediate Past Chapter President Michael J. Elston gave the credit to the members who heeded the call to attend meetings and events in record numbers last year, earning the chapter points for its Americanism Report (which is the report on which most national-level awards are based).

The two awards earned by the chapter for 2013 are the Liberty Bell Americanism Award and the President General's Activities Award (formerly known as the PG's Streamer Award). The George Washington Chapter competed for and won these honors in the category for chapters with 200 or more members. The PG's Activities Award is presented to the chapter with the most complete practice of implementing SAR programs and resolutions, with an emphasis on the chapter's administrative functions and its support of collateral organizations, such as the D.A.R. and the C.A.R. The Liberty Bell Americanism Award "measures how the chapter ... meets the stated SAR goals in programming for the general public," according to the SAR website, and is presented to the chapter that best implemented SAR resolutions and principles during the year.

President General Joseph W. Dooley said, "I am thrilled that the GW Chapter won these major awards while I was national president, and I am proud to be a dual member of one of the very best chapters in the nation." Streamers for the two honors received, along with a streamer for completing the PG initiative for support of the USO will be presented at the October meeting of the Chapter.

Past President Elston said that he was pleased that the strategy adopted by the Board of Managers in 2013 resulted in this kind of recognition for the chapter. "The Americanism Report is a great roadmap for what a chapter should be doing in terms of its programming, service activities, public relations, involvement at the state and national levels -- everything," he said. "We did not fire on all cylinders last year, but we fired on enough to win. There is always room for improvement, and I have no doubt that

the GW Chapter will do even better in the future."

Chapter members also received individual honors at the 124th National Congress. Liberty Medals (or oak leaf clusters) for recruiting 10 new members were presented to Robert F. Carr, Joseph W. Dooley, Michael J. Elston, and James M. Mobley. The Winston C. Williams SAR Magazine Award was presented to Michael J. Elston as the

most cooperative member in supplying usable material for the SAR magazine. Thomas Jefferson Medals for support of the Knight Essay Contest Endowment Fund were presented to Past President Robert F. Carr, Julia Carr and Emily Elston. Finally, President General Dooley presented National Meritorious Service Medals to Ernest B. Coggins, Jr., and Michael J. Elston.

## Genealogy Advice from the Chapter Registrar

In the nine months as registrar, I have seen many applicants relying on published local or family histories. Although at one time these were widely accepted, in recent years NSSAR has restricted the use of these: NSSAR Policy 2011-04 generally only accepts these types of publications when they are sourced (e.g. probate records and census records). If the publication does not reference any such primary source for each generation linkage, then generally NSSAR will not accept it. This has caused some frustration for some applicants as earlier DAR and SAR applications had accepted these. However, I only have had one instance where an application has been pended due to the reliance on this type of record. I have been able to find other documentation to support these applications relying on published histories.

There are occasional exceptions when the unsourced history was published before 1900. The theory is that the son or grandson of the patriot was still living at time of publication, and thus could reasonably be expected to know his parents and grandparents. However, the context of the book has to be provided to validate its accuracy. Typically, the preface will explain the breadth of the author's research (for example, one recent such older book was written by a county probate clerk and thus was considered more reliable). Thus, using even these books published prior to 1900 will not guarantee acceptance by NSSAR genealogy staff.

Related to this topic, Google Books ([www.books.google.com](http://www.books.google.com)) has an outstanding digital library of these older histories. Many of these older books are free "ebooks" that can be downloaded to a pdf format or to your electronic device. Another good source of these digital books is Internet Archives (<https://archive.org/details/texts>). These are worth checking out when attempting to validate unproved genealogies or to find additional genealogical clues.

## DID YOU KNOW?

After the Declaration of Independence was read aloud to Washington's troops and many colonial onlookers, a mob rushed into Bowling Green Park in Lower Manhattan and tore down the 4,000 pound gilded lead equestrian statue of King George III that stood in the park's plaza. General Oliver Wolcott, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, had the scrap metal brought back to his home in Litchfield, Connecticut, where it was melted down into some 40,000 bullets, all of which were used in the Revolutionary War.

## October Dates in History *American Revolutionary War*

October 7, 1763: The Proclamation of 1763 issued by King George III after the end of the French and Indian War / Seven Years' War to organize the new North American empire and stabilize relations with Native Americans. No British settlements allowed west of the Appalachian Mountains. Settlers already in these areas required to return east.

October 1765: The Stamp Act Congress prepares a resolution to be sent to King George III requesting the repeal of the Stamp Act.

October 1767: Boston reinstates boycott of English luxury goods.

October 1769: Boycott of English goods spreads to Rhode Island, New Jersey and North Carolina

October 1773: Colonists in Philadelphia force British tea agents to resign their positions.

October 28, 1776 Battle of White Plains force General Washington to retreat to the west pursued by Cornwallis

October 7, 1777: American victory at Battle of Saratoga

October 17, 1777: Americans capture Burgoyne and his army at Saratoga.

October 17, 1781: American victory at Yorktown terms discussed for the British surrender.

October 19, 1781: The British army surrenders at Yorktown - a devastating effect on the British.

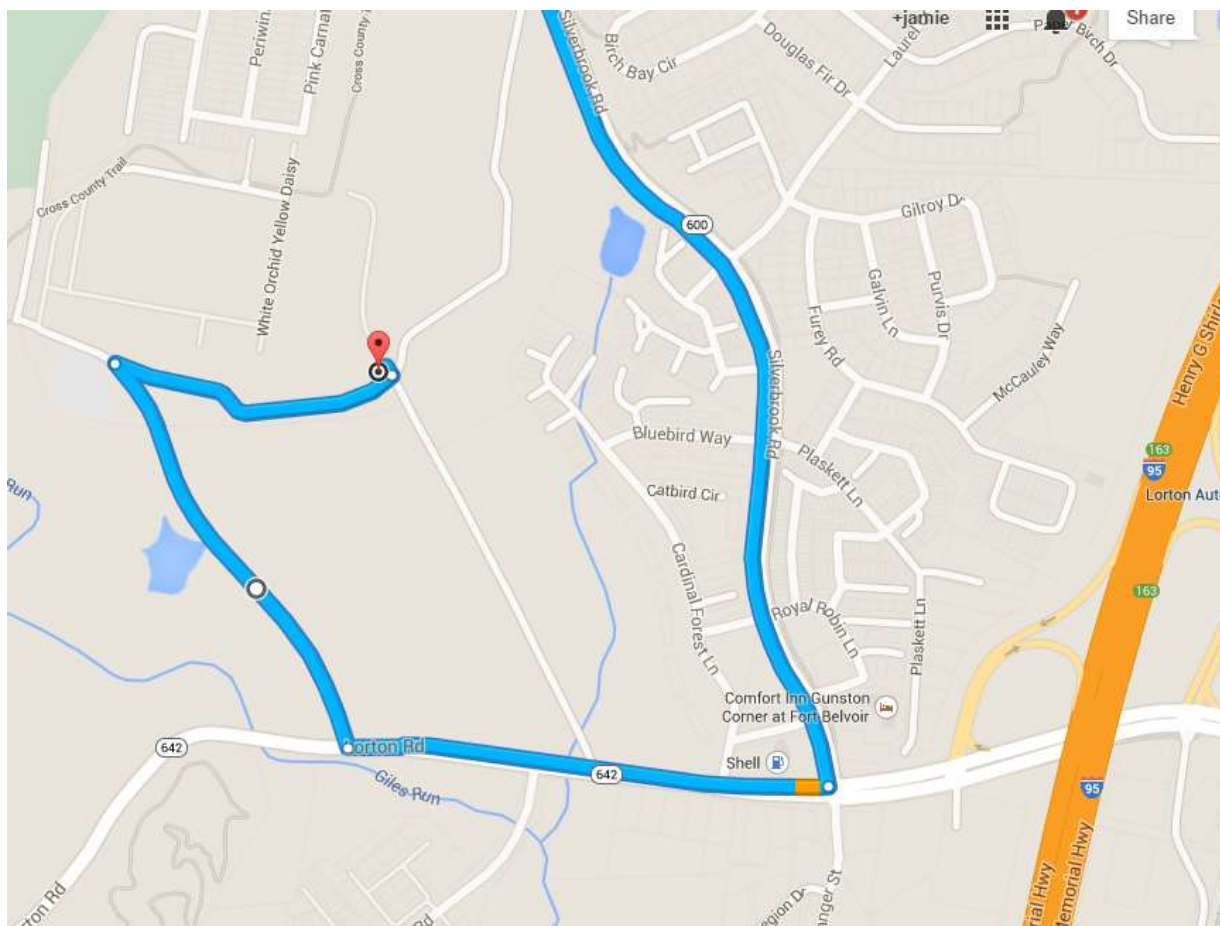
## **Grave Marking Ceremony Planned For 25 October 2014**

The Chapter will be honoring Major William Lindsay on 25 October, rain or shine:

William Lindsay was commissioned in June 1776 as a Cornet with one of the Virginia light-horse troops which subsequently became the 1<sup>st</sup> Continental Light Dragoon Regiment. He was promoted to Lieutenant on 31 March 1777 and was slightly wounded in an engagement near Valley Forge on 20 January 1778. He was promoted to Captain on 7 April 1778 and assigned to Lee's Corps of Partisan Light Dragoons. For unknown reasons, he resigned his commission in October 1778 and returned to his Laurel Hill homestead. In March 1781 he was appointed a Major in the 1<sup>st</sup> Virginia State Legion. Records show he was severely wounded at the battle of Guilford Court-House in May 1781 while serving under General Green, and returned to Laurel Hill to recuperate.

The ceremony will be held at Laurel Hill Cemetery, Laurel Hill Park, Lorton, at 10:00am.

Directions: Laurel Hill Park is west of I-95 on Lorton Road – drive up the hill, turn right and follow the prison fence line. You will find ample parking at the site.



# **William Scott Chambers and Robert A. Crawley, Jr.**

We are sad to announce the passing of two compatriots during the year, William Scott Chambers and Robert A. Crawley, Jr.

Compatriot Chambers passed away on February 8, 2014 in Plantation, Florida. William was a World War II veteran who retired in 1992 as Director of the Maritime Administration South Atlantic Region in Norfolk. In addition to his membership in the George Washington Chapter, he was also a member of the MIT Alumni Association and the Pennsylvania Nautical School Alumni Association. His memorial service was held in Princeton, New Jersey and was interred in Princeton Cemetery.

Compatriot Crawley died February 11, 2014 at the Gettysburg Hospital. Robert was a Veteran of the United States Air Force attaining rank of Technical Sergeant and was co-owner/operator of the Crawley & Thomas Insurance Agency in Lanham, Maryland until his retirement. He was a history buff who was a member of the George Washington Chapter, the Flagon and Trencher Society, and a descendent of William and Isabella Gettys, a branch of the family who founded Gettysburg.

In addition to his wife, Robert is survived by his daughter, Linda C. Bricker and her husband Michael of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, three grandchildren, Lara B. Schlitter and her husband John, William P. Bricker, Sarah R. Bricker, and a great-granddaughter, Kate Schlitter.
