This coming Saturday, we are excited to be able to come together for a live Chapter lunch meeting at Belle Haven Country Club for the first time since November 2020. The meeting will also be streamed live via Zoom to those who cannot attend. Our featured speaker will be Elizabeth Maurer, who will speak to us on *"The Real Martha Washington"*. We will also be presenting JROTC Cadet 1st Lt. Asiyah Khan with her award as our Chapter's Enhanced JROTC Cadet for 2020, and recognizing some other Chapter members who were recognized at the virtual VASSAR Annual Meeting in February. April was another busy and productive month for your chapter.

We began the month with a special ceremony on April 5, at the Alexandria Fire Department HQ, where VASSAR 2nd Vice President Ernie Coggins presented the VASSAR State Level Life Saving Award to Caroline Molivadis, our nominee.

Our Virtual April Chapter Meeting on April 9 was well attended, and we had a very well received presentation of *"Capt. William Croghan's Detachment and the Ten Crucial Days"* by Gabriel Neville concerning the activities of the 8th Virginia Regiment in connection with the Trenton-Princeton Campaign. We were also able to induct two new Compatriots, Larry Dicks and John Griffith. Please review their separate biographies published in the Newsletter to become better acquainted with these Compatriots.

The Thomas Jefferson Chapter and the Virginia Society commemorated the 278th Birthday of Thomas Jefferson with a celebration at Tuckahoe Plantation on April 11. Chapter Vice President Richard Rankin traveled to Charlottesville to present a wreath on our behalf.

On April 12, we participated virtually in the North Carolina Society's celebration of the anniversary of the *Halifax Resolves*. This is one of the dates listed on the NC State Flag and recognizes the instructions given by the NC convention to their delegates in Philadelphia to vote for independence. Although Virginia's resolution was the one acted upon, North Carolina's was the first in time. I presented a wreath on behalf of the Chapter and was joined by VP Richard Rankin.

The Fairfax Resolves Chapter celebrated its annual commemoration of *Patriots Day* (the anniversary of the Battles of Lexington and Concord) on April 18 both virtually and live. I presented a wreath on behalf of our Chapter virtually, and was joined by Richard Rankin and Ernie Coggins.

Martha Washington is an American icon who set the precedent as the first First Lady. Martha was more than a fluffy lady in a white cap. She was a

socially adept, politically astute and an engaging woman who charmed almost everyone she met. She interacted with all the influential military and political leaders during the Revolutionary War and the two terms of her husband's Presidency. Find out how her contemporaries are viewed in *"The Real Martha Washington"*.

Martha Washington (née Dandridge; June 2, 1731 – May 22, 1802) was the wife of George Washington, the first President of the United States. Although the title was not coined until after her death, Martha Washington served as the inaugural First Lady of the United States. During her lifetime, she was often referred to as "Lady Washington". She had first married Daniel Parke Custis, with whom she had four children, and was widowed by the age of 25. Two of her children by Custis survived to young adulthood. She brought her vast wealth to her marriage to Washington, which enabled him to buy land to add to his personal estate. The Washingtons did not have children together, but they did rear her two surviving children by her first husband, son John "Jacky" Parke Custis and Martha "Patsy" Parke Custis.

Presentation of VASSAR 2020 State Life Saving Award


The Sons of the American Revolution recently recognized Carolina Molivadis of the Alexandria Fire Department with the Sons of the American Revolution Life Saving Award.

New Members

Larry Dicks was born and raised in Washington state, earning his BA in 2006 from the University of Idaho while concurrently serving in the Marine Corps Reserve. Later, in 2014 he earned a Master's Degree in Diplomacy from Norwich University in VT. In 2008 he accepted a commission in the Air Force, and is still serving as an Intelligence Officer. He has deployed to Iraq, Afghanistan, Djibouti, and into the Western Pacific aboard the USS Blue Ridge. He currently holds the rank of Major, and serves as the Chief of Analysis for the 613th Air Operations Center (613th AOC) at beautiful Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hickam.

Larry's wife Brenna is an Air Force vet herself, having served as a Weapons Officer on the storied B-52, and is in her final year of law school at the University of Hawaii. Larry expects that an assignment in the DC area is forthcoming, and they intend to make a permanent home here.

For Larry, lineage societies are the logical nexus of his interests in history, political science, and Genealogy; he joined the SAR as a way to learn about and honor his favorite Patriot ancestor, John Peter Corn. Larry is also a proud member of a handful of other lineage societies either through descent or outright from his own military service.

The patriot John Peter Corn was born in 1751, in Albemarle County VA. In February of 1776, he enlisted as a regular in Col. Dangerfield's 7th Virginia Regiment and fought with the regiment through the early campaigns, and was wounded in a skirmish near Philadelphia. He nursed his wounds while wintering at Valley Forge. At the end of his 2-year commitment and still not recovered, Pvt. Corn went home to Virginia. In early 1781, he helped gather supplies and men, then participated in the battle of Guilford Court House. Later that year, he married Hannah Parr. After a few years, seeking better opportunities, he headed south into North Carolina and settled in Henderson County, not far from Asheville. Larry Dicks



His family continued to grow and of his 15 children, several fought in the war of 1812. Pvt. Corn died in 1843 at the age of 92. He lives on, however, as a well know patriarch of the area. Due to his large family, and those of his 3 other patriot brothers, many in Appalachian North Carolina and Tennessee consider themselves a part of a significantly large "Corn" family.



John Griffith

John Griffith grew up in Summit, New Jersey, and currently lives in Falls Church. He has a bachelor's degree in geography from Middlebury College in Vermont, a master's degree in geographic information systems (digital mapping) from the University of Washington in Seattle, and a master's in strategic security studies from the National Defense University, where he conducted thesis research on climate change and conflict. He then spent 10 years in the private sector as a consultant and project manager with Environmental Systems Research Institute (Esri), a California-based software company.

In 1998, John joined the Department of State as a Foreign Service officer and has served at U.S. diplomatic missions overseas in Lithuania, Germany, Taiwan, South Africa,



Egypt, and France. He is currently Director of Ocean and Polar Affairs at the State Department where he works on issues related to the Arctic and Antarctic, ocean conservation, and maritime security.

John and his wife Cherie have a 24-year-old son, Neil, who lives and works in Seattle. John's interests include history, skiing, kayaking, and golf. He is also a drummer and has played in various rock, blues, country, and jazz bands over the years. John was inspired to join SAR by his interest in history, and by his sister who became a member of the DAR last year.

Patriot Ancestor: Born in 1747, John Langdon was a Boston bookseller and joined the Massachusetts militia as a Captain-Lieutenant in May 1776. He was later incorporated into the regular Continental Army, and in February 1777, he received a commission as Captain in Col. Henry Jackson's Additional Continental Regiment (aka the Massachusetts 16th). He served in Jackson's regiment from February 1, 1777, to October 23, 1778; he was with Washington at Valley Forge and took part in the Battles of Monmouth and Rhode Island. He died in Boston sometime after 1820.





May through the years with George Washington

- **1784** on the 4th--Washington attends first meeting of the Society of the Cincinnati.
- **1785** on the 17th--Washington elected president of the Potomac Canal Company.
- **1787** on the 25th--Washington elected president of Constitutional Convention.
- **1789** on the 14th--Congress officially adopts "*President of the United States*" as a form of address for new leader.
- **1802** on the 22nd--Death of Martha Washington.
