President General's Wreath-Laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier



Compatriot Don Francisco Awarded the DAR's Founders Medal for Education



On July 1, 2022, as part of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution's 131st Continental Congress, NSDAR President General Denise Doring van Buren presented George Washington Chapter member Don Francisco with the prestigious Mary Smith Lockwood Medal for Education. The DAR National Board of Management established the four Founders Medals in 1995 - in the categories of Heroism, Youth Achievement, Patriotism, and Education - to honor the four women recognized as Founders of the DAR and to recognize other outstanding American citizens who give unselfishly of themselves to their community, state, and Nation. The Lockwood Medal for Education honors an individual who has shown outstanding achievement through service and leadership in

By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War. Five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signers' houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

1793 on the 18th--Washington sets cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol.


1796 on the 17th--After declining a third term in office, Washington issues his Farewell Address.

New Member Biographies

Eric Norman Atkisson was born in Houston, Texas and grew up in Green Bay, Wisconsin. He enlisted in the Army Reserve when he was 17 and graduated from the Ammunition Specialist Course in 1990, on the same day that Iraq invaded Kuwait. During his first semester of college that fall, Eric's reserve unit was mobilized and deployed to Saudi Arabia, a week before Operation Desert Storm commenced. During the war Eric served at the largest ammunition supply point in military history, in the desert near Hafir-al-Batin. His reserve unit was one of the last to come home.

Eric went on to graduate from Ripon College in 1994 with a bachelor's degree in history and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Wisconsin National Guard. After completing the Infantry Officer Basic Course at Fort Benning in 1995, he moved back to Texas; among other duties he served as a public affairs officer in the Texas National Guard. In 2002, just days after assuming command of a personnel services detachment in Texas, his unit was mobilized for deployment overseas. The Iraq War commenced within an hour of his plane landing in Kuwait, in March of 2003.

From 1999 to 2006, Eric was an assistant professor of military science at Texas State University-San Marcos. After that he worked in public affairs at U.S. Army South in San Antonio, a job that took him to numerous locations in Central and South America. In 2009 Eric, his wife Jianying [JIN-YING], and daughter Sophie moved to Alexandria, Virginia, and Eric did a year of active duty at the Pentagon followed by a deployment to Basrah, Iraq from 2010 to 2011, as public affairs officer for the 36th Infantry Division.

After returning home he transferred to the Virginia National Guard and went to work as a public affairs specialist at the Patent and Trademark Office, where ten years later he now manages a growing

communications division of nearly 20 employees. He retired from the National Guard in 2014 at the rank of lieutenant colonel.

In addition to his bachelor's degree from Ripon College, Eric has a master's in political science from Texas State University-San Marcos and a master of fine arts in creative writing from George Mason University. A graduate of the Defense Information School's Public Affairs Office Course and the Army Command and General Staff College, he also has an advanced professional certificate in public relations and corporate communications from Georgetown University.

He is the published author of over a dozen articles, essays, and short stories, and is currently researching and writing about his grandfather, Morris McCullough, who served as a Canadian infantryman in World War 1 and as a U.S. Navy Reservist in World War 2. Eric recently took command of the Lincoln-Cushing Camp, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and is a member of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States.

His patriot ancestor is John Fuller of Bennington County, Vermont, a 5th-greatgrandfather who was 14 years old when the first shots of the war were fired at Lexington. From the age of 16 to 21, John served in a variety of militia units raised in and around Bennington County in response to various alarms and in defense of the frontiers. Some of those units were commanded by "Green Mountain Boys" like Jonas Galusha and Seth Warner, close associates of Ethan Allen. John's father Elijah also served with the Green Mountain Boys. John Fuller died in 1842 at the age of 81 and is buried in Shaftsbury Center, Vermont with his wife Elizabeth.

Andrew Jackson Bush was born in Huntington, West Virginia, and grew up in Portsmouth, Ohio. He earned a BS from the Ohio State University, an MS from Wright State University and a PhD in statistics and research design from Ohio State in the bicentennial year of 1976. During his doctoral education, Andrew received the Alumni Award for Graduate Student Research and Creative Achievement as well as the Flesher Fellowship Award for Outstanding Scholarship.

Andrew taught mathematics for five years in public schools, followed by statistics and research design for over twenty years at the graduate level. He has held tenured faculty positions at both the University of Memphis and the University of Tennessee Health Science Center. In his career he has received awards for teaching and research excellence, including the University of Memphis Distinguished Teaching and the Phi Delta Kappa Outstanding Research Awards.

In addition, Andrew has had thirteen years of fulltime hospital research experience including serving as Deputy Director of Health Services Research and Director of Clinical Data Management for the Baptist Memorial Health Care Corporation in

Memphis, Tennessee. Additionally, he has held a state level elected office in the Tennessee Health Management Systems Society.

Andrew has published many peer-reviewed research articles, coauthored several books, teamed with other researchers on projects, made research presentations at national and international professional meetings and served on a number of graduate student committees. In 2009, Dr. Bush retired from his roles of Professor of Biostatistics and Professor of Physical Therapy at the University of Tennessee Health Science Center and assumed the role of Emeritus Professor in the College of Medicine at UTHSC.

In addition to his academic work, he has an Honorable Discharge from the Ohio National Guard as an infantry Staff Sergeant. He also holds an FCC Extra Class amateur radio license. In retirement, he enjoys exploring his own ancestry and helping others with their research.

Andrew's patriot ancestor, Patrick Kendrick, was born around 1730 in Stafford County, Virginia, and died in Russell County, Virginia, in 1805. He served in the Revolutionary War under Captains William Russell and James Montgomery of Washington County, Virginia.
