

President's Corner

Compatriots:

With my term expiring in December, this will be my last President's Column. The past year has moved



so swiftly, but I have appreciated the opportunity to serve as your Chapter President.

During my time as Chapter President, we achieved several highlights: our membership grew to 275 members, with 13 new members & 2 supplementals; we presented a record donation by our chapter and individual members of almost \$2,400.00 to the V.S.C.A.R.; we made a donation of \$ 2,000.00 to George Washington's 290th Birthday Fundraiser; Mount Vernon's President & CEO, Doug Bradburn, joined us at our February chapter meeting and spoke of his future vision for the estate; our chapter nominated JROTC candidate, Cadet Kyle Lovejoy won the VASSAR Enhanced JROTC Competition in Richmond and advanced to the national competition; our Public Service Award Committee earned awards in all categories and will be awarded the VASSAR John Blair Public Service Award Streamer in February 2023; our July 4th March to the Tomb at Mount Vernon set a record attendance of close to 140 attendees; our chapter, in coordination with the VASSAR Knight Patty Fund, donated close to \$5,000.00 to Pohick Church for the new epitaph honoring Revolutionary War Surgeon, Dr. William Brown; and finally, our chapter received domestic and international media coverage for marching in the Alexandria George Washington Birthday Parade and during the National Memorial Day Parade on the National Mall.

Many of these achievements would not have been possible without the dedication and support of many chapter members. At our November meeting, I recognized some of them: Our Chapter Registrar, Rich Sherman, was presented with SAR's Liberty Medal (Oak Leaf Cluster) for his continued sponsoring of new members; our Chapter Master-at-Arms, Covert Beach was presented with the VASSAR, Chapter Service Medal (Oak Leaf Cluster) for his continued faithful service ensuring all flags & banners for indoor and outdoor chapter events are displayed; our Chapter Secretary, Scott Walker, was presented with the VASSAR, Chapter Service Medal for faithful service as Secretary and on-site Zoom Master for meetings and increasing Wild Apricot productivity; our PRS team member, Craig Batten was presented with the VASSAR Patriot Graves Preservation Medal for outstanding support in the maintenance of American Revolutionary Patriot Gravesites; but there was more, we presented Craig with the VASSAR, Chapter Service Medal for his diligent efforts to visit more than one thousand patriot grave sites; our Chapter Vice President, Rand Pixa was presented with the National SAR Meritorious Service Medal in recognition of notable services on behalf of our American principles and being an invaluable voice of wisdom to me throughout my tenure.

In recognition for my start in SAR, I presented the Lydia Darragh Medal to my sister, Julia Rankin Fulmer. The medal was named for a Patriot woman who crossed British lines during the British occupation of Philadelphia in 1778 and delivered critical information to General Washington. The medal is intended to recognize the assistance of ladies who work behind the scenes supporting SAR programs. Julie is a twenty-year DAR member in Pennsylvania. The Rankin lineage file which she researched over several months at NDAR Headquarters was made available to me as a PDF which supported my membership application to SAR.

We have some upcoming December events which deserve your participation: on December 3 in Chesapeake, VA the commemoration of the Battle of Great Bridge; on December 10 will be our joint



New Members of GW Chapter

Paul Steven McComb was born and raised in Barrington, Illinois. He attended Northwestern University through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC) scholarship program and received both a Bachelor and Master of Science Degree in Civil Engineering.

Beginning in the early 1990s, Paul's naval career included the Naval Mobile Construction Battalion FORTY; and assignments in Keflavik, Iceland; Norfolk; the Army Command and General Staff College in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas; US Central Command, at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida; then back overseas to Qatar. Later assignments were at the Naval **Facilities Engineering Command** (NAVFAC) headquarters and the Naval Medical Center Bethesda and the Public Works Officer Bethesda. In June of 2013, after retiring from the Navy, Paul started at the U.S Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery (BUMED) headquarters in Falls Church and later that year he became the Director of Facilities and the Chief Engineer.

Paul is a Seabee Combat Warfare Officer, a member of the Acquisition Professional Community, and a registered licensed Professional Engineer in the State of Virginia. His personal decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), numerous additional military medals, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers de Fleury Medal (Bronze Order), the Society of American Military Engineers' M.G. Ploger Medal, and the Armed Forces Civilian Service Medal.

Paul and his wife, Deborah, reside in Falls Church, Virginia. Their daughter, Angie, is a recent graduate from the University of Pittsburgh in Industrial Engineering and resides in Pittsburgh. Their son, Peter, is a senior studying Business at the University of South Carolina. Paul is an active member at Our Savior Lutheran Church in Arlington, Virginia; and he is the District 17

Robert Clayton Norris, Jr. started out the first 14 years of his life in New Jersey. His father, an Army officer, was transferred to Virginia for two years and then to Okinawa, where Bob graduated from Kubasaki High School, meaning he never had to worry about a class reunion. He went on to get a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry at Frostburg State College in Maryland, an MBA at George Mason University, and a doctorate in artificial intelligence at the University of Florida.

Bob is a defense intelligence senior executive in the Department of Defense, and he served in Afghanistan. He has also been a professor at National Defense University, a senior analyst at the Government Accountability Office, an Assistant Professor of Management Information Systems at the University of North Florida, and an IT Consultant working in Malaysia. His hobbies are golf, kayaking, attending performances at the Kennedy Center, skiing, and international travel.

From his teenage years Bob had an interest in family history and in 1967 he learned about one of his lines, the Watson family, from a book at his grandmother's house. It mentioned that a Watson fought in the American Revolution, but he could not tell how they were related. Years later when he asked a relative about the book, he discovered it was lost.

Recently Bob found a digitized copy on the Library of Congress website. Through the book and related searches, he discovered he was a direct descendant of Colonel James Watson (1743–1831). He received his commission as Captain on July 8, 1776. His commission as Colonel was dated July 1, 1777. His initial assignment was to the First Battalion of the Flying Corps of Lancaster County, PA, and they were stationed in Amboy, NJ. From there they were ordered to the Battle of Long Island and were stationed at King's Bridge until George


Fairfax Resolves Honor John Carlyle



By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War. Five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signers' houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

1799 on the 14th--Death of George Washington.

1799 on the 18th--Funeral and burial of George Washington.

Paul's patriot ancestor, Elizabeth Lambert, was born around 1754 in Virginia. Around 1772 she married Jacob Springston who died in 1778 and as a widow she performed patriotic service by providing provisions to the Continental Army. She died in 1787 in Harrison County, VA

Washington crossed the Hudson River. After the war he settled in Lancaster County, PA.

Patriot Research System

PATRIOT RESEARCH SYSTEM (PRS) - FIVE YEARS LATER

The PRS was launched in January 2018 and if you have not looked at it in a while, you might want to do that as it has changed a lot over the past five years -- NSSAR PRS (sarpatriots.sar.org)

One key feature today is the ability to access "Member Only" features by clicking LOGIN button (upper right side). That will take you to the NSSAR site so you can enter your NSSAR username and password. You then automatically are taken back to the PRS site with



member privileges. Try it to see the additional features that will now be available to you.

A key part of making the PRS a success has been an effort by many Volunteers to upload NSSAR approved record copy (RC) lineages. RCs detail the Compatriot's lineage to his Patriot as well as critical information about each Patriot. This effort is now over 99% complete for about 160,000 RCs – all the RCs approved since 1970.

One of your George Washington Chapter Compatriots, Craig Batten, has spent the past year locating and visiting cemeteries all around Virginia, identifying Patriot graves and GPS coordinates, and updating the PRS. This effort supports the PRS capability to map Patriot burials within each County and to use Google Earth to create interactive map presentations. You can see a Virginia-wide map of Craig's efforts at <u>Virginia SAR Patriot Cemetery Map</u>.

The Descendant Search feature has been improved – it now allows you to search for Patriot connections to your lineage. Descendant Search will compare your Ancestor to the individuals found on approved RCs and where matches are found, provide you with links to the Patriot, the matching Lineage and the Compatriot. This implementation is increment #1 in what will eventually be a "Patriot Tree" that will connect all common ancestors within the PRS Lineages and allow you to navigate up and down these lineal branches.


