Other creative possibilities for meetings through the year will be before the Board of Managers for consideration.

Young Men of the Revolution

The men behind the Revolutionary War from 1775 to 1783 were extremely brave. They were willing to risk their lives just to fight for a chance to have their own country, a chance to have freedom. Their ages varied, but one group of heroes that not many people talk about are the young men who fought alongside their fathers and siblings. They might have been young, but they still made a massive difference.

In the 1760s, the British and the Americans were clashing with each other over issues such as taxation, trade, and colonization. This would lead to different conflicts happening between the two. One of the most important conflicts was the first fought battle, the Battle of Lexington and Concord. The British had marched into Lexington and Concord, meaning to seize weapons and prevent a war, but they ended up losing to the American militia and sparking one. While the British had a strong army, the American army was made up of mostly farmers and merchants. They did not have experience fighting, but they were confident and brave, putting their lives on the line for what they believed in. Many of these volunteers were adults, but there were also young men in the midst, ranging from ages 15 to 18. There were even a few younger.

One of these young men was Connecticut's Joseph Martin. A year after the war began, at the age of only 15, Martin joined the army, even though the joining age by law was 17. He would help fight for the next eight years of the war until it finally ended. In his old age, he proceeded to write a book and release it¹, revealing the thoughts and feelings he had during the time. In his book, after his allies were fired upon by the British, Martin claimed the "demons of fear and disorder seemed to take full possession of all and everything on that day". He was nearly in shock, looking at all of the belongings left over at the spot that was fired upon. He did everything he could to help a sick, injured comrade but he could not save him. However, he still persevered and continued to fight. He was a true hero for his time.

Another example of a brave young man is William Diamond from Massachusetts. He signed up to be a drummer boy for the militia. Because of the loud noises during battles, orders could be difficult to be given to troops. The drummer boy's job is to drum certain patterns to convey messages to the soldiers. They are often close to the warfare and exposed to danger. That proves that Diamond was willing to sacrifice himself for the greater good.

Not many people ever think about any of the younger men who helped fight in the Revolutionary War. They are relatively unknown, but they have helped make a massive impact in the history of our country. They inspire me to be braver when I am conquering my problems. If they could do many brave tasks, I should be able to do anything I put my mind to.

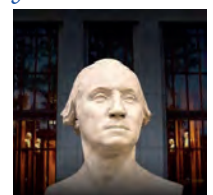

Great Bridge Commemoration

The Annual Commemoration of the Battle of Great Bridge took place on December 3, 2022 in the City Council Chambers in Chesapeake, Virginia. (Inclement weather pushed the event indoors). This National SAR event was attended by GW President Richard Rankin, Chancellor General Mike Elston, V.S.C.A.R. President Will Elston, and past GW Presidents Jay Henn (with wife Bonnie) and Tom Roth. This was the 122nd Annual Commemoration by the Great Bridge Chapter, NSDAR, and the 12th Annual Commemoration by the Norfolk Chapter, VASSAR. The Battle of Great Bridge was an early Patriot victory, which led directly to Lord Dunmore's evacuation of the major port of Norfolk, and prevented British control of the Chesapeake Bay.

Meetings customarily are held at 11:30 a.m. on the second Saturday of each month (June, July & August excepted).

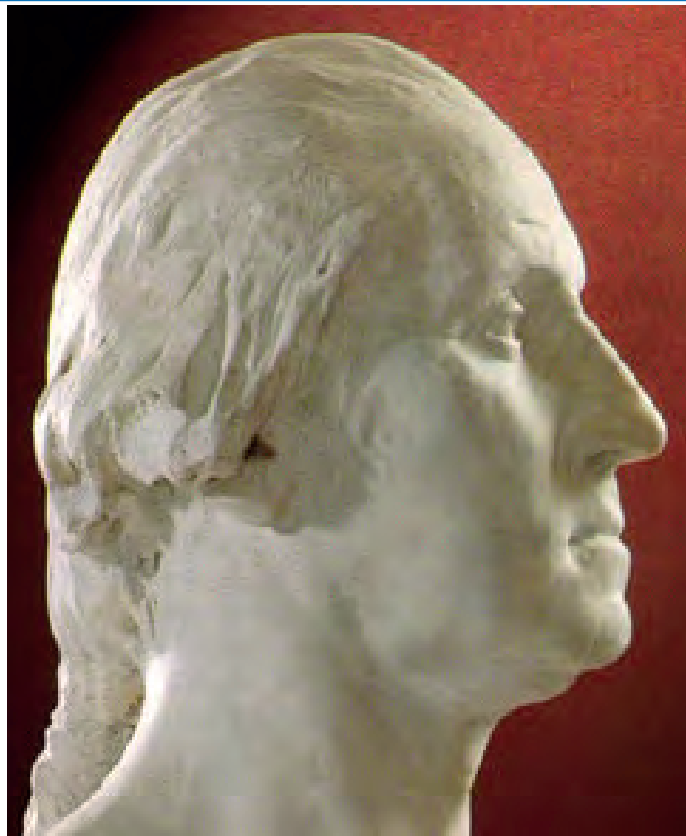

Pocatello, ID Veterans Day Parade

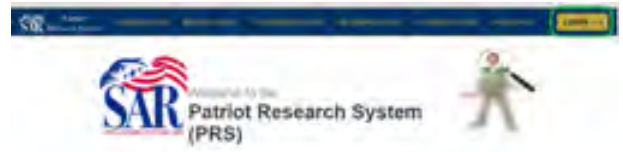

Patriot Research System

PATRIOT RESEARCH SYSTEM (PRS) – FIVE YEARS LATER

The PRS was launched in January 2018 and if you have not looked at it in a while, you might want to do that as it has changed a lot over the past five years -- NSSAR PRS (sarpatriots.sar.org)

One key feature today is the ability to access “Member Only” features by clicking LOGIN button (upper right side). That will take you to the NSSAR site so you can enter your NSSAR username and password. You then automatically are taken back to the PRS site with member privileges. Try it to see the additional features that will now be available to you.



A key part of making the PRS a success has been an effort by many Volunteers to upload NSSAR approved record copy (RC) lineages. RCs detail the Compatriot's lineage to his Patriot as well as critical information about each Patriot. This effort is now over 99% complete for about 160,000 RCs – all the RCs approved since 1970.

One of your George Washington Chapter Compatriots, Craig Batten, has spent the past year locating and visiting cemeteries all around Virginia, identifying Patriot graves and GPS coordinates, and updating the PRS. This effort supports the PRS capability to map Patriot burials within each County and to use Google Earth to create interactive map presentations. You can see a Virginia-wide map of Craig's efforts at Virginia SAR Patriot Cemetery Map.

The Descendant Search feature has been improved – it now allows you to search for Patriot connections to your lineage. Descendant Search will compare your Ancestor to the individuals found on approved RCs and where matches are found, provide you with links to the Patriot, the matching Lineage and the Compatriot. This implementation is increment #1 in what will eventually be a “Patriot Tree” that will connect all common ancestors within the PRS Lineages and allow you to navigate up and down these lineal branches.
