Why do I ask that? -- Because your Chapter needs a lot more active participation to come close to its potential to advance our shared ideals of honoring, preserving, and bettering the Constitutional Republic our Patriot ancestors sacrificed to create. It has been an honor to have now served as an officer of the Chapter for four years. And I have seen much of the difference between what a relative handful of members who work really hard to do and the vast potential to connect with broad segments of the public to expand understanding of the revolutionary philosophy and ideas that were provided an opportunity to bloom through the struggle of the Revolutionary War. This 250th anniversary decade is a good time to reflect and to rededicate ourselves.

I went through the 260 names of adult Chapter members in our roster one-by-one and checked those who I knew had actively carried out the work of the Chapter in the last year and more broadly in the experience of my four years. This year it was 81/2%; including them, the number was 10% over the past four years. With the "heavy lifting" of those members we have been able to achieve broad successes including full rounds of robust meetings, production of high-quality Newsletters, signature events including the George Washington Birthday Parade, National Memorial Day Parade, Fourth of July March to the Tomb, wreath-laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and Veterans Day wreath-laying. Our America 250, Scouting, Gravemarking, Public Safety, and JROTC Committees have been particularly active. And frankly, vast effort has flowed into the administration of the Chapter. So, thanks to the 8½% who made all of

that possible, but without a larger group of active contributors, maintaining the historic and present level of activity, let alone any expansions, may not be possible with those few active members stretched too thin.

The opportunity to maintain, improve, and fill the potential is great; to attract the engagement to take advantage of it, we likely need to do one or many things differently. What to add, what to drop, what to modify? That's where you and all other Compatriot members come in. What should we be doing new or differently to make the George Washington Chapter more worthy of your time and interest? How should the Chapter attract your interest and effort? Your ideas and desires are the key. So, please share them. And when you share your ideas, please don't think of them as suggestions or requests to an anonymous "they." The 22 or so actively engaged members of our 260 are already operating well beyond reasonable capacity. With the new ideas must come many more hands to craft the vision and bring it into reality.

I close as I began, please call or write to me, or call or write to another member of the Chapter's Board of Managers with your ideas on how we can improve the Chapter and make it more conducive to active participation and do more of what you want. Let's Tell the Story of Alexandria's Patriots!

Each Patriot has a story to tell us about themselves; let's tell it! Each participated in the struggle for America's Independence, and their legacy and impact still ring loudly within our community near and far. We, as descendants and compatriots of the nation's largest male lineage organization, are each thankful as we celebrate America's 250th Anniversary and no place is that truer than with those interred within the City of Alexandria and surrounding Fairfax County areas, including our namesake George Washington. In all, the City of Alexandria is the final resting place for more than 85 Patriots of the American Revolution with burials located in 12 of the city's 28 recorded cemeteries within the SAR Patriot Research System (PRS).

Whether it's Samuel Cooper who participated 250 years ago in the Boston Tea Party on 16 December 1773 and went onto to become a major in the artillery. Or, 1st Lieutenant Henry Piercy who served in Pennsylvania regiments, and after the war is credited as Alexandria's first known potter with works that are presented today at the Alexandria Archaeology Museum. As we move closer and closer to the apex of the 250th Anniversary of our Nation, their struggles and triumphs become important chapters to the overall story for Alexandria and its role within the American Revolution.

No less than nine Patriots have served 13 terms in total as the city's mayor between 1780 and 1812 including: Robert T. Hooe (#1), James Hendricks (#2), William Herbert (#3/#30), David Arell (#7), Dennis Ramsey (#11/#15), Philip Marsteller (#13), John Dundas (#17/#20), Francis Peyton (#19/#21), and Elisha C. Dick (#27).

Thanks to the incredible foundational work by Compatriots Craig Batten, Jamie Callendar, Paul Walden and many others, the entire Commonwealth of Virginia's listings within the SAR PRS are likely more well-documented than any other state (okay, Georgia SAR has done an outstanding job too!). Nearly all cemeteries and the Patriots interred within Virginia, including Alexandria, have headstone photographs, GPS coordinates, and the appropriate DAR Genealogical Research System (GRS) and Find-a-Grave cross-references. This is not nearly the case in many other states.

Because of this great work, our chapter is leading an effort to tell more of the story of these venerable Patriots by completing the biographies of each person's civil, patriotic and/or military services performed, certainly during the war, but also their contributions after the war are often just as important in the founding of our young Nation.

CALL TO ACTION: Volunteers are needed to assist in the completion of the biographies for each of the 85 Patriots interred in Alexandria before the George Washington Birthday Celebration Parade in February 2026. I have done 20 or more biographies to date and have insights to draw upon for the most common online resources. Currently, 4 of the 12 cemeteries have biographies for all interred Patriots, but there are more than 55 Patriots whose stories have not been told. Once completed, we plan to develop and publish a unique book to present to the City of Alexandria as part of America's 250th Anniversary celebration. This work also enriches the Historic Sites section of the Chapter website, and supports future Grave Marking ceremonies and memorials in the coming years.

1781 on the 5th--Death of Washington's stepson, John "Jacky" Parke Custis.


1783 on the 2nd--Washington bids farewell to army at end of Rev War.

Building a Bridge with the Virginia Children of the American Revolution

October 7th was the day on which our Chapter helped to build a bridge with the Virginia Society of the Children of the American Revolution, when our purpose was as much to build a bridge *to* the C.A.R.

The Virginia C.A.R.'s annual project is to honor the French contribution to our Nation's independence in the 200th anniversary year of General Lafayette's farewell visit to the United States after the Revolution. The Virginia C.A.R. State Theme and Project for 2023-24 is styled "France: America's First Wingman." The C.A.R. is partnering with the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Association, Inc., Virginia (W3R-VA), in its "film project which includes filming, editing and producing documentary episodes of the 15 historic sites along the national trail in Virginia, including interviews with noted trail historian Robert A. Selig and famous historical characters. The cost for filming and editing each episode is approximately \$2500-\$3000." The C.A.R. is also partnering with the American Friends of Lafayette commemorating "the 2023-24 bicentennial of Lafayette's farewell tour, [by funding] a set of educational panels, and will be noted as an official sponsoring organization (along with [the] DAR, SAR, and many others) on all tour materials during this 18-month commemoration of Lafayette's farewell tour."

In support of the theme, the C.A.R. chose a service project along the Washington-Rochambeau route to Yorktown through northern Virginia. The National Park Service had identified a footbridge (Con't next page)

adjacent to the remnants of the Washington-Rochambeau route that passes through the Prince William Forest National Park that needed replacement. The Virginia C.A.R. took on the project. The work on the 7th entailed hauling all of the materials necessary for the replacement bridge down a rather steep, half-mile grade, demolishing the existing bridge, constructing the major components of the new twenty-foot bridge, putting them in place across a streambed, assembling the rest of the new bridge, and then back-hauling all of the old bridge the half-mile back up the grade to the accessible trailhead. It wasn't light work; telephone poles underpinned the bridge which was replaced. About twenty C.A.R. members, their parents and advisors, and George Washington Chapter SAR Compatriots Rich Sherman and Rand Pixa worked for more than four hours to complete the new bridge which won the praise of the National Park Service maintenance supervisor overseeing the work. The new bridge will last a long time. The ties and friendships built during the work may last longer.
